SN (Steve) NORTON MEMORIAL TREE

The Lenswood Memorial Park was opened in April 1949 as a memorial to those of the community who served in World War Two.

Near the park's entrance gate is a tree, planted in memory of Stephen Norton, the inaugural secretary of the Park Committee. The tree has grown, over the years, into a fine specimen of Californian Redwood (*Sequoia sempervirens*), a species known for its longevity.

Steve came from a large family. His parents were Samuel Gascoyne Norton and Sarah Ann Stafford, who married 20 February 1896. They lived on the corner of Tiers Road and Lobethal Road, Lenswood in a small home that managed to fit a large family.

Steve was the ninth child. His eldest brother, William, was killed in WW1 and his youngest brother, Hartley, was killed in WW2. Their names are recorded on the two local war memorials.

Steve was very community minded and was a keen cricketer as were most of his family. His father was a regular correspondent to the "Chronicle" under the pseudonym of "Tommy the Sweater." Perhaps this is where Steve got his 'dramatic' aspects from. Steve was an active membership of the Lenswood Amateur Dramatic Society. This group toured hills townships in the late 1920's and early 1930s presenting plays, including some written by the group. His involvement in community events also stretched to organising social events at the Methodist church and at the Mission

Hall.

Steve married Reta Rowley and they build a house at 655 Tiers Road, Lenswood. They had three children; Lyndon, Vaughan and Cecilie.

Steve died as a result of a car crash in Weethalie, N.S.W. on May 15, 1952. A Norton relative had been in Lenswood to visit his family and he was driving to his home in Tamworth with Steve joining him to visit his relatives. The car overturned and Steve was killed. He was almost 43 years old and was buried at Lobethal.
